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A Simplified Welsh Topographical Dictionary

A surprisingly large number of common Welsh Place Names may be translated by reference to one word of List 1, combined with one from List 2. However, mutations make life difficult; the most common changes of initial letter in place names are as follows:

 $b \rightarrow f$ $c \rightarrow g$ $d \rightarrow dd$ $m \rightarrow f$ $p \rightarrow b$ $t \rightarrow d$ Thus, for example, Felin (Mill) is shown as the root form "Melin", and goch (red) as "coch".When f occurs as a final letter, it is often dropped:-pentref \rightarrow pentre (village)

"Gwynedd" is the new county name, and that of the ancient kingdom whose area it roughly covers.

"Arfon", "Lleyn", "Mon" and "Aberconwy" are the District Councils of Gwynedd.

The Suffix -le generally denotes "place" e.g. "Hyfryd-le"

Likewise -fa or -fan:- Canol-fan (Middle Place, i.e. Centre)

Morfa ("sea-place", i.e. sandhills, dunes)
